
## KITTEN LOVE

The Tranisition Pathway have had another busy half term visiting both next step provisions, such as South Devon College, Turning Heads and ROC, and work experience settings, such as Maidencombe Farm, Torbay Leisure Hotels and Winners Gym. Our young people have successfully spent a morning learning and practising their first aid skills. They have also been swimming at TLC, spent time perfecting their dance and yoga skills in college and have worked on their CV's and updating their work experience records.

We have been incredibly impressed with how hard they have been working at being independent. They have taken responsibility for themselves as well as working hard as a team. Our work experience stars deserve a special mention; Tamzin, who has been volunteering in Class 7 at Mayfield, Luke, who has been working at Winners Gym and Shaun, Amie and Mickey have all thoroughly enjoyed their time at Occombe Farm.

### **VOCATIONAL**

This term has been filled with a variety of trips, including Exeter Museum. Some of our Vocational Pathway students have started visiting Turning Heads, where they have engaged in multiple activities, learning new skills and meeting old friends. We have also begun to visit ROC Farm as an introduction to work experience and it has been amazing! The students have been helping feed the pigs, move the cows and clean the chicken coops.













During this half term, Acorn have been learning all about sound. The topic was kicked off with a drumming workshop with Drum Devon, where they learnt about vibrations, high and low, loud and quiet, different tempos and dynamics.

# The Science of SOUND

In Science sessions they investigated how sounds travel through different materials, experiementing with string telephones and recording what materials made for the best soundproofing.

They then made their own instruments, composed their own songs using digital software and created written texts on all their findings.
















Maple class have been working very hard in their Maths sessions, strengthening their knowledge in space, shape and measure principles.

Using cubes they have investigated the differences between different lengths, and the correct language to use when recording their findings.











### **Brixham's History**

Oak class have been researching World War 2 as part of their topic this term. A visit to Battery Gardens & Heritage Group in Brixham provided a fact filled day and brought the history to life.

The pupils explored the war shelter, gun emplacements, the observation post and had a glimpse into life during the War in the museum centre.
