




REMINDERS

STEM Experiments

Imbedding Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths ideas into everyday learning has seen a hive of activity across the school this half term. Pupils have been designing and building tent frames with poles and connectors, making adjustments to provide better support, whilst others have made mini-beasts using pipe cleaners and straws.

Under their topic of Super Scientists, Class 13 have focused on the Roald Dahl story, George's Marvellous Medicine. The pupils have enjoyed making their own marvellous medicines and deciding what the medicine would do to anyone who drank it! They were surprised by some of the things that happened when they mixed their ingredients together; some potions overflowed and bubbled!

























PHYSICAL Activites in PRIMARY

Movement and physical activity is an important part of the pupil's day and our primary pupils have been very active this term!

PE sessions have been a favourite, allowing pupils to develop their balance and gross motor skills on the climbing equipment. Ball games have helped pupils work on their hand-eye coordination and yoga activities have offered a chance for them to focus on their breathing and relaxation skills.

During break times, pupils have taken to our outdoor play areas to exercise in a play based environment. They have also taken trips around the local community, promoting mobility within everyday tasks, such as walking to the shops.

Building on **ESSENTIAL SKILLS**



Maths and English skills are embedded in most activities throughout the school day. Class 4 have been working really hard to develop their knowledge and skills.

Pupils visited the main library to discover new books and some pupils acted out scenes from their stories in their classrooms.
























Many classes have had access to cooking sessions over the half term, developing essential living skills.






Using the internet, students successfully planned a trip to Exeter on the train where they then used maps to locate the library and the shops they wished to visit.


Whilst in the community a focus has been on road safety and all students have grown in confidence in their knowledge and understanding.




Red Nose Day
