












Classes have also been busy hunting a variety of leaves to create their own 'Leaf Man' pictures, finishing off by adding eyes to bring them to life!


LIFE & LIVING: Skills for Life

The focus for this half term has been upon the community. Students have used local bus timetables to plan a journey. They researched local shops and attractions in Paignton, comparing different options.

The group also enjoyed a session with Rocksteady, exploring the different instruments they had to offer.










INDEPENDENT LEARNING
